EO 20-99 and MDE Updates

- Organized youth and adult sports organizations and programs must stop all in-person activities—including practices, group workouts, games, and tournaments.
- Prohibited social gatherings do not include educational and care services for children and youth, including childcare, educational support services for distance and hybrid learners, and other educational services.
- Any worker who can work from home must do so, and from EO 20-82, staff who are medically at risk or members of household must allowed work from home to the extent possible, use ADA analysis, no blanket orders in either case.
- **MDE:** as districts move to distance learning, they are to use "available staff who are able to work in 20-21" consistent with labor agreements (**EO 20-82** paragraph 13)
- **MDE:** EO 20-99: school facilities cannot be utilized for **ANY** sports but can be rented for childcare and after school programs. PE classes can use gyms and weight rooms as part of their curriculum for academic purposes only.








Grassroots Support








COVID Numbers + Learning Model


- Kanabec County Case Rates (99.98/10,000)

What is working well?


- o Communication, teamwork, and grace

- Cases rates will increase as evidenced by similar issues around the world with people inside buildings.








The COVID Equation – A Game with Strict Rules

- (T+Hn+Dv)/(Dp+AC+Mq+Fe+Vs) = chance of getting COVID
 - T = Time at a location
 - o Hn = Number of humans
 - Dv = Density of viral particles expelled
 - Dp = Distance between people
 - o AC = Air changes
 - Mq = Quality of face covering
 - Fe = Filtration efficiency
 - Vs = Volume of space

Future of Ventilation and PPE

- Increase focus on good ventilation and good filtration
- Shift in balance from energy efficiency to the need to ventilate for health
- Local filtration makes a big comeback
- Increase in research for bipolar ionization and UVC disinfection
- Increase capacity to bring in more outside air
- Develop PPE for non-health care worker that is reusable and sustainable
- <u>M3/M4 mask</u>





Vaccines and Transmission

- Vaccines many will receive vaccine by the summer of 2021
- Vaccinated person could still be an asymptomatic carrier
- Waiting on need for booster shots and tests for effectiveness

Schools

o Control measures work at both K-12 and at the University level


Home
